KLONDIKE GUIDELINES and IMPORTANT INFORMATION

REGISTRATION:

Please complete and use the attached registration form. Generally, registration will be by troop, however, individual registrations will be accepted. *Patches will be distributed at Check-In*.

Troops should pre-register at the Flint River Council website: http://www.flintrivercouncil.org

COMING BACK FOR 2023 is the popular Saturday lunch! Choose from 1 hamburger or 2 hot dogs. All meals come with a bag of chips and a drink. Tickets for each meal will be distributed during Check-In or at the point of purchase.

CAMPING:

There is ample camping space available, however, expect your neighbors to be close! Sites are first come first served; you can camp anywhere on reservation property except the designated event areas near the dining hall, grass parking areas, and roped off areas of Joanne Field.

CAMPSITE ACCESS AND PARKING:

Troops are limited to one trailer or pickup truck in the campsite. You may drop off gear, but please remove extra vehicles **immediately**. Passenger vehicles will not be allowed, temporary access to the campsites will be for gear drop off only, and you will be allowed only one vehicle at a time into the camp area. A scout is courteous, let others have the space. **Park:** Vehicles will park in the parking lot across from the front of the River Experience Center. The entrance is directly across from the River Experience Center driveway. DO NOT enter the field any other way... once someone drove over the water line and we had NO WATER all weekend.

ABSOLUTELY NO CAMPING in the parking lots OR in the roped off area of Joanne Field.

WEATHER:

This is a rain or shine event. BE PREPARED! It can also be cold, so please prepare your scouts.

FIRES/FIREWOOD:

Ground fires are permitted only in the permanent fire pits. All other fires must be in a fire barrel that you bring. Also, bring your own firewood and charcoal. Winter camping is also a great time to pull out the Coleman and Dutch ovens.

WATER:

Freeze proof water spigots are at the metal building behind the River Experience Center. Ask the staff to show you. Expect to carry water containers 200 yards. A wagon or cart comes in handy. Water is also available at the bathhouses for water needs.

PORTABLE TOILETS:

Port-a-potties will be on site. The women's toilet is NOT for use by male scouts. Based on past experience, it is important that Leaders impress on scouts what "a scout is CLEAN" means, and how it applies to port-a-potty etiquette.

HEALTH AND SAFETY:

Troops will generally be responsible for the health and safety of their own scouts. Please have a full first aid kit, with triangle bandages and splinting material for each patrol. Staff will assure that events are planned and run in a safe manner. This is a youth run event. All staff members will be wearing their OA sash or OA T-shirt. They all have assigned jobs. Please comply with all requests. Watch the weather forecast, have your Scouts are prepared... and things will be FUN!

CAMP WIDE GAME:

Test your scout skills, creativity, and ingenuity. Further instructions given at camp.

TRADING POST:

We will be offering a trading post with snacks and other items to buy. Look for more details upon arrival.

AWARDS:

There will be a first-place prize for each activity and first-place prize overall.

RULES AND REGULATIONS:

- The SCOUT OATH and SCOUT LAW will guide all activities and individual behavior. Observe the OUTDOOR CODE at all times.
- Minimize Site Impact
- Clean up after yourself, especially at the port-o-potties.
- Observe the "Guide to Safe Scouting"
- Scouts are not allowed in the Parking Area unless accompanied by an adult or an OA staff member. Violators will be asked to leave the Klondike.
- The Scout Uniform is appropriate attire for all activities. Class A uniform should be worn for the SPL/SM Meeting, Flag Ceremony, Campfire Program, and Worship Service. Class B uniform may be worn at all other activities.
- Senior Patrol Leaders and your Troop OA Representative will be responsible for communications between the OA staff and your troop. The SPL and his assistants are responsible for getting patrols to activities on schedule.
- At least one adult leader per 10 scouts camping (minimum of 2 adults per troop).
- Units are required to remove their trash. Leave your site better than you found it!
- The OA Lodge may ask your troop to perform some service function, such as flag ceremonies, etc. We encourage troop OA members to step forward and assist the troop OA rep with these assignments.
- This is a Scouts BSA event. No provisions are being made for Cub Scouts. Webelos are encouraged to attend as troop guests as part of their troop visitation/campout requirement. Please follow all Webelos guidelines Troops are to plan Webelos event/activities, separate from the Klondike events.
- No boom boxes, radios, or Games. Respect quiet time.

NEED TO BRING:

- Bring everything you need to start and build a real fire.
- Proper clothing, bedding and tenting for the weather, and the 10 Scout essentials.

INI-TO LODGE #324, YOUR SPONSOR

Ini-To Lodge #324 of the Flint River Council and the Order of the Arrow sponsors this event in order to promote camping and teach camping skills.

Having fun is highly important, and having fun on a cold weather campout depends a lot on learning to be safe and warm in cold weather.

There will be opportunities to meet your lodge officers, get to know them and get to know more about what the OA lodge does. Lodge flaps and other items will also be available for purchase, and it's a great time to pay your \$15 annual dues if you haven't done so already.

BROTHERHOOD MEMBERSHIP

After 6 months of service as an Ordeal member and after fulfilling certain requirements, a member may take part in the Brotherhood ceremony, which places further emphasis on the ideals of Scouting and the Order.

Completion of this ceremony signifies full membership in the Order. Meet with our Lodge Secretary at the Dining Hall to learn more about Brotherhood membership.

SATURDAY EVENING CALL OUT CEREMONY

There will be a Call Out ceremony at the Saturday evening campfire. Please have your unit election forms ready to turn in on Friday evening check-in. If needed, we can arrange a unit election for your troop.

As Scouting's National Honor Society, our purpose is to:


- Recognize those who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives and through that recognition cause others to conduct themselves in a way that warrants similar recognition.
- Promote camping, responsible outdoor adventure, and environmental stewardship as essential components of every Scout's experience, in the unit, year-round and summer camp.
- Develop leaders with the willingness, character, spirit and ability to advance the activities of their units, our Brotherhood, Scouting, and ultimately our nation.
- Crystallize the Scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of leadership in cheerful service to others.

ANNUAL KLONDIKE SLED RACE (After Lunch at Lake)

Heat race line up by 1:30 p.m. to start three sleds at a time. Should take 10 minutes for three sleds new heat every ten minute for multiple sleds in each heat.

This is a timed race, starting at 1p.m. with a new heat every ten minute for multiple sleds in each heat. ANY SLED DESIGN WILL BE ACCEPTABLE, as long as one scout is on board and no more than five are pulling. No wheels or propulsion systems other than Scouts will be allowed.

BE PREPARED! Some troops have extra sleds, so do not be afraid to borrow one. The event will be on dirt, snow, ice, mud or grass depending on weather conditions. Any asphalt touched will be by mistake of the musher.



The above is for demonstrative purposes- your results may vary.

KLONDIKE COMPETITIONS (tentative and subject to change)

Events will be held between 9:00-12:00 noon, and 1:00pm-3:00pm unless otherwise noted. Troops with the most patrols or scouts should follow schedule sheets given out at flag raising.

There will be 4 areas of games at Klondike this year: General Rec, Scout Skills, Science, and Range Sports. Please be sure to visit every area and have as much fun as possible!!

GENERAL RECREATION

- **Brown Sea Basketball.** Test your skills from the hardwood court to this scout camp version of shooting some hoops.
- Waguli Stick. Can your patrol/troop keep it going for three minutes?
- **Shoe Kick.** Who can kick their shoe off their foot the farthest?
- **Tangled.** A true test of your troop's teamwork and comradery. How much coordination and how long will it take you to untangle yourselves in this team building classic.

SCOUT SKILLS

- Log Pull. You will need to know how to use scout knots and teamwork or be a quick study. (Lift with your legs and watch your toes)
- Make your own flag pole. Using provided objects build your own.
- Paul Bunyan. Your troops best Paul Bunyan wins with fewest tries at splitting a chunk of wood. (NOTE: Scouts should bring their favorite ax and safety glasses. A few will be available as well.)
- Crosscut Saw. Two competitors use a crosscut saw to slice their way through, in just a
 few seconds, horizontally fastened block. Crosscut sawing is a true test of teamwork and
 strength.
- **Rope Burn.** How long will it take you to light a fire and burn through a rope?
- **Stretcher Race.** Using materials provided, who can transport an injured Scout the fastest?

SCI-TECH

- **Egg Drop.** Test your knowledge of physics at this station. All eggs will stay with the Lodge to provide for food safety.
- **Paper Airplanes.** Show your skills at throwing a piece of paper with frag.

RANGE SPORTS

- Scout Archery/Rifle Shoot (Morning). Pick your units best Archer and for skill and accuracy. They are to be at the range at 9:00 am. WEBELOS will have rotation after 1030 until 1145.
- Throwing Tomahawks (afternoon). Test your throwing skills.
- Wrist Rockets- early prep for Groundhog's Day. Test your hawkeye skills! The WEBELOS will start shooting at 9:00 am. WEBELOS only event.
